This was a lovely event with children from the school singing and a visit from Father Christmas. It was so good to see it so well supported and to enjoy the real sense of community that these events can foster. We also had a good number on New Year's Day when we gathered for a short service of prayer and dedication before sharing a delicious lunch together.

Nature Notes



We have been delighted to have our first visit of the winter by a flock of goldfinches.

A flock of these beautiful birds is called a 'charm.'

It has the typical heavy finch bill and is roughly the size of a sparrow.

It is distinguished by the red face and by a yellow bar across its black wings and a white rump is seen in flight. It enjoys the niger seeds which we put in our bird feeders. Goldfinches are very gregarious and are normally found in large groups.

Their nests are built by the female who is identical in shape and colour to the male bird.

The nest is a neat and delicately woven cup of plant material, usually including thistledown. The nests are well hidden in the upper branches of small trees. The females usually lay four to six eggs from April to early May, incubated for two weeks entirely by the females.

The baby birds are fed by regurgitation that is, food being first digested then coughed up into the mouths of the baby birds. They still depend on their parents for about a week after they have fledged.

The juvenile goldfinches are much plainer in colour, mainly a streaky brown colour.

Heating Comfort in Worship

In a recent Sunday address Julia invited debate on how our faith would be affected if the church was not here. Perhaps a little far-fetched you may think. General consensus said our individual faith would continue, however opinion was mixed on the value of our communion and its potential survival with no regular meeting place available. An interesting theoretical argument one might conclude as with the grace of God our lovely church building will hopefully survive and continue to prosper.

This prompted me to think of the less dramatic but very inconvenient prospect of our heating system failing to provide us with a comfortable environment for our worship and other activities. You will doubtless remember the extreme weather last winter, and when our heating failed to perform we endured an uncomfortable period when our personal attire needed constantly beefing up to sustain us in a freezing cold church!

The problems last year resulted from the breakdown in the integrity of 40- year old wiring and connections, caused by damp and natural wear and tear.

The repairs carried out last year have thus far been successful in restoring adequate warmth levels and, subject to some ongoing adjustments we are on course to achieving a balance of comfort, optimum temperatures for the fabric of the building itself (including the Bevington organ) and not least, saving of electric power! However the deterioration of old cabling etc is likely to continue and therefore the Fabric Team has agreed in principle to commission a refurbishment and simplification of the control equipment before the 2013 winter season which should then give us future continuity.

Whilst it is lovely to walk into a warm atmosphere akin to the cosiness of our homes, please bear in mind that the church is a large open space which takes a great deal of heating up. The masonry /stonework takes a while to react to the temperature generated, initially absorbing the heat until a point when it begins to radiate some of its acquired warmth back into the surrounding space. Even when this point is reached we must also be keenly aware that excess heat can easily

damage the structure, causing wood to move, warp and dry out. We will always endeavour to favour the comfort of the congregation but it is possible sometimes during especially cold weather conditions you may need to keep that coat and scarf on!

Have faith in your fabric team – we're here to help!

Parish Charities

To continue our overview of the records, I am looking at the Account of the Proceedings of 25 January 1815. This meeting was the culmination of seven years of investigations by Joseph Sabine to get the charities back on an even keel.

Some time prior to 1760 all the estates had become vested in one set of trustees, five of whom being alive in 1778 at the Inclosure of North Mimms Common. However, when the last trustee, Sir Charles Cocks, later Lord Somers, died, the estates devolved to his heir, who by then had no connection with the parish. Hence the detailed review that had been prepared and was presented to the meeting, chaired by William Casamajor and attended by the Rev Elwin (Minister), Messrs Sabine and Mason (Churchwardens), Messrs Baxter and Owen (Overseers) and thirteen named inhabitants (all male) with such names as Gausson, Gould, Holloway and Traveller.

At the meeting, eight new trustees were appointed and a document (all in copperplate handwriting) was produced, setting out the charities and listing the 65 acres of land held by the combined charities. Also it was decided that an account of the property belonging to, and the object of, each charity, be placed in the church in a conspicuous position. What were produced are with us to this day – the dark green boards in the porch.

In his capacity as Churchwarden, Mr Sabine had administered the charities from 1807 to the end of 1814. During this time he paid out to needy widows at the rate of four shillings per week the sum of £232, plus £96 for additional bread. Needless to say, the revenue and the law also were well paid - £31 in Land Tax, £27 in Property Tax, and for the overhaul of the charities, legal expenses £33, survey and map £11. To put these values into context for those of a younger age, the map alone represented 55 weeks of widow's benefit.

Next time we shall look at the estates of the charities.

Stewardship Renewal 2013

February sees the start of our 2013 stewardship renewal campaign. The support of everyone at St Mary's to the basic principles of stewardship, using our own time talent and money to return to God some of the gifts he has given to us, continues to be truly wonderful and words just can not express the gratitude that I know Julia and the churchwardens feel. However, I am again forced to highlight the difficult financial situation that we still find ourselves in. Our expenditure continues to be well contained, but it also continues to be greater than our expected income. For 2013 the financial projections suggest a shortfall of around £13,000 of anticipated income against projected expenditure. This projects a reduction of the deficit from 2012 but will, non-the less, again mean we will have to draw down on our reserves. The main areas of capital expenditure budgeted for 2013 include works on the Belfry window, heating system, action to tackle damp on the south wall and a significant amount for replacing parts of the rainwater/guttering system, the latter has been delayed for a couple of years but must be dealt with now as a matter of urgency.

I will be giving a brief update on our financial position after the 9.30 service on February 17th so please come along if you would like to understand more about this. I am very grateful to those of you who use the Gift Aid envelopes on a regular basis, could you please consider taking another step towards supporting our church by entering into a pledge to give a regular amount on a weekly or monthly basis?

Cash donations are always welcome but, if you are a taxpayer, please consider donating using a Gift Aid envelope as this will increase the value of your gift by 25% 'just like that'.

As always I am very happy to discuss any aspects of stewardship at any time so please chat to me in church or contact me via the phone number or email address shown below.

Finally I would like to reassure anyone who already makes a pledged gift to our church, or to anyone thinking of committing for the first time that, should your financial situation take a turn for the worse, you are perfectly free to reduce or suspend your payment until your financial situation is back on an even keel. All I would ask is that you let me know that you will be changing your pledged gift amount and what the new amount will be.

Mighty Men of Mymms

A tribute to the 248 men of North Mymms who enlisted for World War I, 45 of whom were never to come back.

Mr Benjamin Mallett Headmaster of the Welham Green Boy's school, published in 1919 The North Mymms Roll of Honour. A copy was given to each of the men that served or to the surviving relatives as well as a copy to St. Marys which is still kept in the old vestry. This red leather bound book gives names and where possible details of the men that served. Now, nearly 100 years on, to commemorate the 100th anniversary in August 2014, Mike Allen is looking to reissue the book with more detailed information using the Parish Magazines for the period, Mr Mallett's Book, the census returns for 1911, the war memorial itself and the internet. Mike hopes to bring it alive once again with more information that was not available back then and pictures of as many of the men as possible - 10 so far!

Some of the facts discovered are fascinating, one private soldier had a Christian name of Major, what difficulties that caused him we can only wonder at. John Frederick Game received his fatal wound 2 hours before the armistice stopped the insanity and did you know there are 2 North Mymms WWI graves in St. Mary's old churchyard, which is listed as a War Grave site. They are Thomas Nash of the Bedford Regiment who died whilst training in England in 1916 and Arthur Gray who died in St. Albans hospital on Christmas day 1918 due to the effects of dysentery for which he was discharged from the army in 1918.



Charity News: Send A Cow

At the end of last year, St Mary's Away Giving for 2012 was donated to various charities, locally, nationally and internationally. The sum of £7950 was given to 18 charities, some of which we had helped before, but also to some new charities.



One of these new charities is Send A Cow. The charity started in Africa over 20 years ago and works hand in hand with poor families, providing them with training, livestock, seeds, tools and support as well as teaching them the skills they need to build new lives free from poverty and hunger. In turn, these families then pass on young livestock, seeds or training to others. This 'pass it on' principle builds stronger communities, and allows even more people to develop skills, confidence and self-respect.

Send a Cow doesn't offer a quick fix solution to poverty and rural development. Typically they work with groups of farmers for five years to effect substantial and sustainable change. In addition to ongoing training in animal well-being, sustainable organic farming practices and natural resource management, their work also provides courses in subjects such as gender equality, conflict resolution, health and hygiene and HIV/Aids awareness. This balance of practical farming skills with social life skills is a potent mix and produces remarkable results. This year, almost 14,000 families will be helped along on their journey out of poverty. Each of those will go on to lend a hand to an average of 10 further families, restoring real hope to communities in rural Africa. The long-term aim of the charity is to help 55,000 families by 2015, thereby transforming the lives of 300,000 people in Africa. Those who benefit include families, women, orphans, child-headed households and people living with HIV/Aids. They have often lived in extreme poverty – despite their hard work. But with the support of Send A Cow they are starting to feed their families, send their children to school, earn a steady income, and lead happy and fulfilled lives. Letter from Devon

Dear Friends,


2013 is off at a gallop and it is already much too late to wish you a happy new year. I do hope it has started well for you. We decided to remain closed to guests during January so that we had an opportunity to have a post-Christmas clean-up, do some maintenance jobs, and have a ski holiday. The first two of those things we are in the midst of as I write this, I have the paint smudges to prove it. The third, a trip to France, is coming up soon and will be our first encounter with Exeter airport, let's hope it is a good one.

Of course there are many things here that we are doing for the first time, making little discoveries, often on our doorstep. Today I discovered Coryton Cove just beyond the main part of Dawlish. The town of Dawlish is a pretty place known mainly for its red cliffs, black swans, and the feat of engineering known as the most expensive stretch of railway in the country. There is a river (Dawlish Water) running right through the centre of the town down to the sea: very picturesque. December was a wet month and the river ran a dark reddish colour as water poured into it from the fields and moors. The combination of a high tide and a full river has all the shops reaching for their sandbags, but is a tremendous sight as the water churns in the bay and sprays up against every surface. Today however was a mild, dry, calm day, not a sign of that energy. My stroll along the sea front heading south took me first into Boat Cove, a well known landmark at the end (or so I thought) of the town, and obviously a safe haven for boats pulled up clear of the tide. It was only then I realised that the path continued around the cliff and soon found myself passing by a little row of brightly coloured beach huts and entering Coryton Cove, a delightful surprise. I have since looked it up on the internet and see it is described as "one of Devon's hidden beaches", "secluded", "a treasure", etc. It is indeed all of those things, very sheltered and very different from the wide open beaches of the Warren and the long stretch of bay between the Warren and Dawlish. It must get busy whenever the weather is warm, but on this winter's day I shared this lovely place with just another dog walker and felt again the now familiar thrill of living here.


Friends, Foes and Families – Lenten meditations on Bible characters and relationships

By Judith Dimond, SPCK, £7.99

The Bible is full of stories about people in very human relationships. Some relationships are good, some are bad; some are healthy and fulfilling, others broken, dysfunctional and destructive. But they all have something in them that helps us to view our own relationships in a clearer light: to explore what they really mean to us, and think about what might happen if they are nurtured or left to decay.

In this captivating Lent book, Judith Dimond paints vivid pen portraits of Bible characters whose relationships reflect common predicaments and emotions: love, friendship, rivalry, conflict, trust, hatred and fear, to name but a few. Running through all these relationships is a repeated pattern of wilderness, death and resurrection, and each daily meditation explores one or other element of this threefold pattern.

With the author's beautifully crafted prayers interspersed throughout, this book could help you to think prayerfully about significant moments of decision in your life.



When you pray – daily Bible reflections for Lent and Easter on the Lord's Prayer

By Joanna Collicutt, BRF, £7.99

'This book arises from my increasing awareness that the Lord's Prayer contains all that Christians really need to know; it is the very essence of the Gospel... My prayer is that you will have a sense of the great privilege that has been granted to us of holding a precious gem in our hands, of being able to delight in its radiance, play with its many facets, plumb its depths, gain a

sense of peace and security from its touch, and in so doing deepen our awareness of our union with Christ.'

In these Bible readings for Lent and Easter, Joanna Collicutt shows how growing as a Christian is rooted in the prayer Jesus gave us. As we pray the Lord's Prayer, we express our relationship with God, absorb gospel values and are also motivated to live them out. As we pray to the Father, in union with the Son, through the power of the Spirit, so we begin to take on the character of Christ. The Holy Week readings encourage us to pause, watch and wait at this special season; commentary is kept to a minimum and we spend time reflecting, in the light of the Lord's Prayer, on Luke's description of Christ's passion and resurrection.
